The Editor Interviews Jon Holloway

Jim: Jon, you spend an enormous amount of time working with the Tuckesse Turners woodturning club. I hope members appreciate all you do to help out. Were you a founding member of our club?

Jon: No, I joined the club in 2002 or 2003

Jim: Some members already know that you are the President of the F.O.P. Lodge where we meet. Tell us how this benefits your lodge as well as our club.

Jon: When I joined the club we were meeting on Red River St, in a small room. First thing I thought about was moving the club to the FOP Lodge. For a long time the FOP lodge was only used once or twice a month like having the woodturners there. I hope we will be there for a long time.

Jim: I hope so too. This is an excellent benefit to our club. And it is only available because you are willing to put in the time and effort. I thank you on behalf of the entire membership.

You have periodically pulled our equipment trailer many miles. What are your experiences relative to that and the turn-ins that you would like to share with the members? You are also a great wood turner...and a good woodworker in general.

Jon: A man by the name of Stan Brown (who passed away about three years ago) asked me to go to the turners meeting. That was the same night I joined. The person that helped me the most are the members of the club. I am always learning.

Jon: As far as woodworking, my dad was the big motivator. He was a master carpenter. So were my two oldest brothers

Jim: Most turners get settled in on one or two specific types of items that they enjoy producing. What is your favorite and why.

Jon: Hollowed items like vases and vessels are what I like to do most. I like working with the hollowing tool.

Jim: What is your favorite wood?

Jon: Cedar

Jim: How is most of your work finished?

Jon: I now use wipe on poly. I have tried a lot of finishes, from buffing to poly. It depends on the item.

Jim: Do you sell anything or are most of them gifts and for your personal collection?

Jon: Gifts. Herriet gives them to friends.

Jim: What can we do to improve on our club...meetings, demonstrators, turn-ins, etc.?

Jon: It's hard to say. I like the club and what is going on. Bob is doing a great job. With everything that is going on, activities, etc, more people could come out and help. We need more people to get involved.

Jim: Can you suggest any demonstrators?

Jon: That's a hard one. I think everyone should give it a try.

Jim: Thanks again for agreeing to this interview. Keep up the good work.
